During this last fiscal year, the Modesto Gospel Mission has experienced growth in many of our programs and services. The Mission's 12-month "New Life Program" has increased by some 40%! From serving 50-60 men and women, we now impact close to 70-80 at any given time. We have also seen our emergency overnight shelter volume in both the men's and women's emergency shelters hit 95% -100% capacity on a nightly basis. Also, during this last year, we launched Volente Coffee Roasters and have expanded this social enterprise into a workforce development track for those within the New Life Program. This increase in services and its impact is due to our alignment with the wonderful community of donors and volunteers that sow into this ministry – freely donating their time and resources. Thank you for your generosity! As we head into this upcoming year, we are eager to continue to diligently serve those who are less fortunate In Stanislaus County, meeting their tangible needs and pointing them to Jesus.

Shelters seeing change

Addicted women, children hit streets
More homeless now are women

More than ever, the homeless people on the streets are women and children. Those who minister to them find growing numbers are beaten or drug-addicted.

"There is so much need (in Modesto)," said Mildred Thiessen, assistant director of the Exchange Home, a Fresno shelter for women and children since 1964. "You can see that out on the streets if you're in the right places. The community as a whole is unaware. I don't know if by choice or not."

Thiessen was one of 133 delegates in Modesto Friday and Saturday for the annual training school of the International Union of Gospel Missions.

Crescentary United Methodist Church played host to the delegates and board members who offer food, shelter and the Gospel to homeless in 10 Western states, scattered South and Midwestern states and two provinces in Canada.

Delegates considered, among other things, what Mission's "Voices" Director Steve

Thiessen said part of coping for Modesto will be construction of a new women's and children's shelter, now on the drawing board. Barbara Deatherage, director of development for the Modesto Gospel Mission, said she hopes to see a ground breaking in the middle of 1991 for a center of at least 13,000 square feet.

The existing women's shelter on Page Court houses nearly 30 people on some nights in space designed for 13.

"We're just skimming the surface," she said. "The need is so great that we're turning people away every night."

Thiessen agreed that even at full capacity, shelters are dealing with just a slice of the problem. The need has expanded since about 1984, she said. Many more women now bring drug, alcohol and violence problems with them.

"We began to see more family stresses at that time. I don't know whether it's the economy or what, but many husbands are no longer keeping their jobs."

Thiessen said part of coping for Modesto will be construction of a new women's and children's shelter, now on the drawing board. Barbara Deatherage, director of development for the Modesto Gospel Mission, said she hopes to see a ground breaking in the middle of 1991 for a center of at least 13,000 square feet.

Thiessen suggested that changes in American industrial society may be leading to semipermanent classes of homeless, jobless or underemployed people, much like during the Depression.

Aggravating the predicament are drugs. Their spread Thiessen attributes to the erosion of family values and the rise of instant self-gratification.

"The best things we do for our women is we rebuild their self-esteem," she said. "We tell them you are somebody special, that God made you."

Christian values are part of the prescription at Gospel Missions.

"The future of all these children is at stake," she said. "They learn that nobody cares about them so they don't have to care about anybody."

Modesto's new shelter for women would cost nearly \$1 million, Deatherage said. She hopes donations of labor and cost to half.

The demographic of homelessness has changed. In Stanislaus County, can you guess what percentages over the last three years make up youth under 18 years of age? Or what percentage makes up women? The numbers are glaring.

Stanislaus County has a drastic lack of shelter bed inventory for these most vulnerable members of the homeless community, including here at the Modesto Gospel Mission, where over the last few years we have had to resort to placing cots in our shelter living room or allowing women and children to sleep on the floor of our chapel.


Of the 210 shelter beds at the Modesto Gospel Mission, 79% are men's shelter beds, with only 21% being allocated for women and children. This is an unfortunate byproduct of outdated gender ratios. Our region's needs have changed, and we are working diligently to address these issues.

From Darkness to Light:

A JOURNEY OF REDEMPTION



Evelyn's story unfolds from a challenging past of abuse and homelessness to discovering hope and faith at the Modesto Gospel Mission. Witness the transformative power of faith, community support, and perseverance that broke the chains of addiction, paving the way for a life filled with purpose, stability, and a newfound connection with God. This compelling narrative is a testament to the triumph of the human spirit and the potential for redemption and renewal.

What type of home were you raised in?

I grew up in a broken home; my dad was separated from my mom and would often come around and be the protector when need be, especially when my mom would get into fights with her boyfriends. If I could describe the home I was raised in, I would call it a "party house."

How would you describe your childhood?

I was regularly left alone and even sexually abused at a young age. I always lived in rough neighborhoods and growing up. I always felt that I had to impress my peers to be accepted by them, or even act the way they expected me to. I honestly had a horrible childhood. At the time, I mistook my lack of parental guidance

as unwarranted freedom.

What led to your addiction, and how old were you?

I was 13 years old, and I hadn't even tried alcohol before I decided to try methamphetamine. My mom used it and I would regularly steal some to use with my friends. It's crazy to think that the first thing I ever tried was meth, but I guess that's just the way my story goes.

Did your family find out you were using meth?

Yes, my mom found out shortly after. It had only been about a year of me using when her friend found out and let her know. Instead of trying to help me change, my mom started providing it to me. We began using meth together when I was 14 years old.

After you began using, what happened in your life through your teens?

A lot of drug use. I did whatever I wanted whenever I wanted. When I was 15, my brother committed suicide. I was confused when this happened because he was a part of the sexual abuse that happened to me. I was so torn because I felt dirty for missing him and being sad my big brother died, yet at the same time I felt relief that it would never happen again. This confusion and hurt drove me to have a lot of anger toward my mom, and I spun out of control. I joined gangs and used meth and weed regularly. I became violent and abusive toward the people I loved, and even my mother began encouraging me to quit using drugs and even quit herself. I didn't listen. I didn't care how she felt or what was best for me. I felt like I deserved to live that life. It was all I knew.

Let's jump forward. You have kids. Tell me about that.

I have four kids, ages 18, 13, 11, and 10. Three girls and my youngest is my son.

When did you start having kids? How was your life then?

I was 21 and managed to get clean when I met my soon-to-be husband. We began dating and got married when I was 23. I should have walked away, but six months into our relationship, he began abusing me. At 25, I had my first child. I always wanted a kid and I always wanted to be married. I thought that these events would change my life and I would go on to live the life I could only dream of. When the abuse stopped during my pregnancy, I had hope that our lives had finally changed. My husband would leave for days at a time, but I still held out hope. A year

after my daughter was born, the abuse began to creep back in. Even more so, alcoholism and infidelity became the bigger issue. I held on to that relationship until I finally got the courage to leave him when my daughter was three. The damage was done. The stress had brought me back to drug abuse and I left as a single mother with a drug addiction.

What happened that led you to homelessness?

After I left my abusive husband, I realized I needed to be clean and sober for my daughter. I knew there would be a custody battle and needed to do everything I could to provide for her. I roomed with other people for about five years until my custody battle was settled. I met my second daughter's father and our relationship quickly ended when I found out he was using drugs. I was not going back there. At this point, six years since leaving my husband, I still didn't have permanent housing. We would jump around and live with families in their guest rooms. This trend would continue until I met another man and had two more chil-



dren with him. That relationship was toxic from the start, and we lived with his dad all the way through my two youngest being born. My youngest was almost one year old when I ended up relapsing again. We were still living with my boyfriend's dad when his dad decided to evict us. Faced with homelessness we began living in hotels. My ex-husband took custody of my oldest daughter, but I was completely homeless with my younger three children and my boyfriend. Sometimes, the five of us all slept in a car if we did not have money for a hotel room. My addiction spiraled downward and I became hopeless. My boyfriend started to become abusive, and I began to fight back. I ended this relationship.



What brought you to the Mission?

I finally rented a room from a family friend when this friend observed the toxicity of my relationship with my boyfriend and the destructiveness of my life. She told me she wanted to help me leave him and get my life together. She found out I was using drugs and brought me to the Mission. I was hesitant. I was terrified. I didn't know what to expect. Actually, I would call the Mission every day for a week and ask if there was room. Somehow, each time I would call there was room for me and my kids. I was too scared and told my friend each time that it was full. This continued until a week later when God nudged me and I finally went to the Mission. It was the best decision I have ever made.

So where are you at today in your life?

I don't even know where to begin with this. Shortly after staying in the shelter here I decided I wanted to join the New Life residential program. I wanted to know about God. I would go on to

graduate the program and now work full time at the Modesto Gospel Mission as the front office clerk! For the first time in my life, I rented a house that the Mission provides and me and my kids have the first place of our own, EVER! I get to decorate for seasons, build memories with them, and set the tone for my family. THIS is the life I dreamed of.

Is there anything you want people to know?

Today I want people to know how your life can change when you build your foundation with the Lord. In the season I am at in my life, this Bible verse is something that I can stand firm on as God's promise.

2 Timothy 1:7 "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind."

He calls us not to fear but to lean and press in to him and to trust him with any trials that we face, because we will face them.

At nine months old I was diagnosed with cerebral palsy which is an umbrella term for a series of motor skills disorders. In my case, it affected my balance, posture, and legs. My parents divorced when I was only five years old. Even though they were separated, they did work together to raise us. I made it through school okay and was even on the high school wrestling team. After high school, things started to go downhill for me. I lost sight of my goals and became like a leaf in the wind going every which way life was directing me with no real direction. Due to this, I had accomplished nothing of significance. I became depressed and started drinking. I kept it under control for many years and became a "functioning alcoholic." It was after the loss of my father in 2021, that I began drinking more than ever. My drinking started taking over every aspect of my life, and I didn't care about anything anymore. Eventually, it got so bad that a family member told me about the Modesto Gospel Mission. I was hesitant at first, but I decided to join the New Life Program. Since being here my trust in God has strengthened and my outlook on life has become more positive. I no longer wake up and feel like I'm fighting myself.

Growing up I knew my father was addicted to drugs. When my mom finally left him, she found a new man who I know as my dad. I was saved when I was 12 years old at a Billy Graham evangelistic crusade. I grew very obedient to God and honored my parents and still do to this day even though they are now divorced. As life went on I grew up to be an army wife for 5 years but really didn't know God at the time. When that ended, I became homeless in Sacramento for 5 years. I was an IV user and then became pregnant. I bounced around through shelters and then lived with my dad for a little bit. I ended up losing my son to CPS. I had to work nights while jumping through hoops to get him back in 6 months, but I did get him back by the grace of God. I'd love to say things stood out great at this point, but they didn't. Our housing fell through when the landlord died. My ex drove my son and I here and ran out of gas right in front of the Mission. I know God brought us here and I am so grateful for that. I was using meth and fentanyl but stopped when I became a guest here. I was still smoking weed and a pack of cigarettes a day while being a guest here. I couldn't join the program until my son was of age to go to school, but as soon as he was, this past August, I joined the NLP! I am now clean and no longer surrounded by all the wrong. Jesus is my number one hero! My son and I are taken care of and more here at the Mission. He is happy. I am growing and praying more. The classes here in the New Life Program make such a difference. I get so much support here. I am happy to be here. God is working every day in my life. "Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and forever."

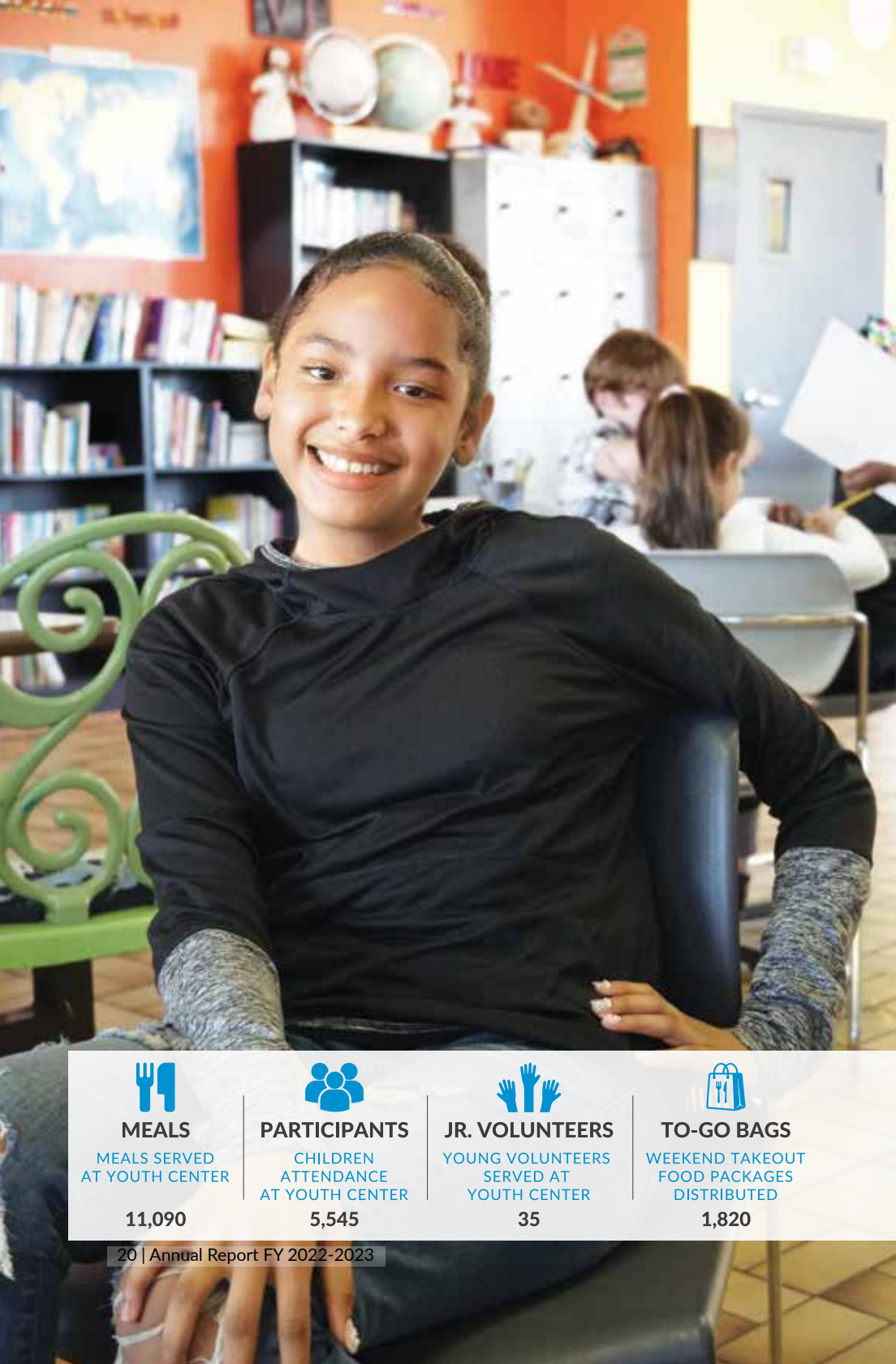

"I grew up with both parents at home until they got a divorce when I was eight years old. At that young age I thought it was my fault, so I tried to kill myself. My mom decided to move us to Modesto, and then she was diagnosed with cancer and passed away. The night before she died, I tried meth for the first time. I moved in with my dad when I was 15 and started getting really into drugs. I got pregnant when I was 17. I was able to quit using drugs when I got married, but this didn't last long. I haven't always had my daughter with me. I have unfortunately been in and out of her life along with being on and off of drugs. My drug use led me to become homeless. I ended up spending about 6 months in a psychiatric hospital. Once I was released, my aunt brought me here to the Mission. I came here and got a bed at the women's overnight shelter and the next day started attending Freedom Road Day Center. I go there every single day. The day program gives us a time and place to put God first. I am in the Word every day now. The day program has made me feel safe. I really enjoy the volunteers who come to do Bible studies with us. I love the women here who support and encourage me. I talk to my daughter every day now and even my dad, aunts, and grandma. I am so grateful for everyone here at the Mission."

Beatrice's Journey to Stable Housing for Her Children

A recent study showed that 60% of all homeless women living on the streets have children under the age of 18. This sad truth can stem from any number of reasons. When Beatrice found herself having to move due to her landlord selling the house she rented, she ended up at a park with her small children. Coming from a past of brokenness and despair, as well as speaking only the Spanish language, she found herself in a very traumatic situation. Beatrice was approached by a lady who told her about the Modesto Gospel Mission. Prior to this, Beatrice had heard about the Mission but never thought to come here, but never thought to come here. She knew she had to come to the Mission for her children. As soon as she arrived at the Mission Beatrice was welcomed with open arms. She was worried because of her language barrier; however, she met our staff who was able to communicate with her and

assured her that she would be taken care of. Her children were supplied with everything they needed, including food, clothing, shoes, and supplies for school. After going through case management here Beatrice was promised that she would have housing for her and her children by the time her oldest son reached the age of 13. As the days grew closer to her son's birthday, Beatrice grew weary. Not long before the date, Beatrice was told that the Modesto Gospel Mission had a small housing unit for her to reside with her children. It was truly an act of God the way this housing unit became available. Beatrice now has a home for herself and her four children. She still brings her children to the Youth Center and she has a deep gratitude to the staff who God used to help her get back on her feet.

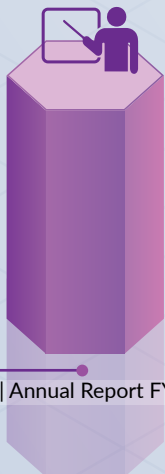

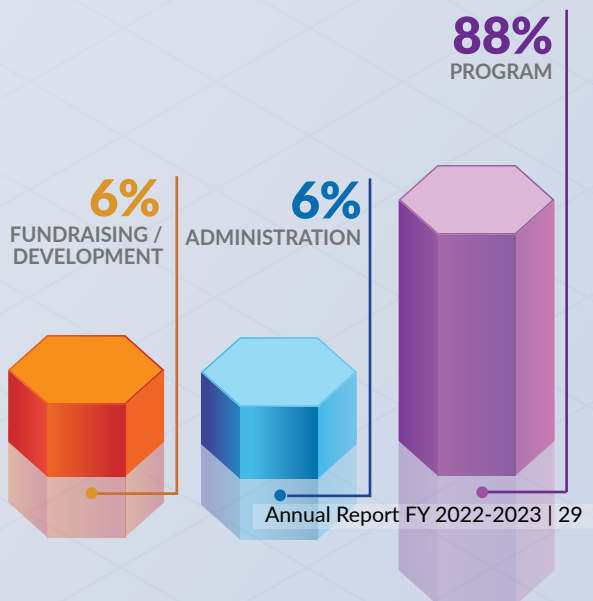

I have joy in life again and I have the privilege of being involved with the Mission's Volente Coffee Program. 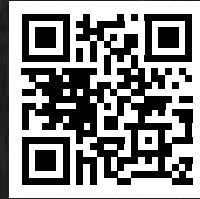
