

URGENT ACTION NEEDED

For years, Stanislaus County has struggled to provide adequate shelter for the increasing number of homeless women and their children. Hundreds are forced to live in unsafe conditions because our shelter capacity is stretched to its limit. But we're taking action—and thanks to our generous donors, we are making Hannah's House a reality.

So far, we've raised \$2.4 million of our \$3.4 million goal. This incredible progress wouldn't be possible without your support. But we still have a ways to go, and now is the time to finish what we've started.






A New Beginning for Women and Children

Hannah's House is more than a shelter; it's a safe haven. It will offer 95 beds and a fresh start for women and children in our community, providing them with a chance to escape homelessness, rebuild their lives, and find hope again. This transformative space will provide access to crucial resources like counseling, spiritual discipleship, job training, and healthcare support, empowering women to regain independence and stability.

Progress of Hannah's House:

- \$2.4M raised of the \$3.4M needed.
- Demolition completed in record time with all labor and costs donated for free. Replacing the roof was completed in October. Primary construction started in December and is ongoing through early 2025.
- Anticipated opening: Late Spring 2025, ready to welcome women/women with children in need.

We are grateful for the ongoing support from our community and partners, and we invite you to continue contributing to this life-changing project.

Hi Gina, thank you for being here and sharing your powerful story. Can you start by telling us about your life before arriving at the Modesto Gospel Mission?

Of course. Before I came to the Mission, my life was in a really dark place. I was homeless, living in a tent by the Feather River in Marysville with my abusive boyfriend. I had lost custody of my children and was trapped in drug addiction. I felt utterly lost, with nowhere to turn and no one to turn to. One night, I heard a voice telling me to get up and leave. I didn't know where to go, but I knew I had to leave that situation. So, I just got up and left. I ended up wandering, still using drugs and spending time with strangers, feeling like I had no direction.

That's incredibly brave, leaving without knowing where you'd go. How did you end up finding the Modesto Gospel Mission?

A complete stranger bought me a bus ticket to Modesto after I met her at a hospital. When I arrived, I didn't know where I was or what to do. I ended up on the streets for about 30 days, still hanging out with abusive men and struggling with addiction. Then one night, a man invited me to eat, and he brought me to the Mission. We attended a chapel service, had a warm meal, and I felt something I hadn't felt in a long time—hope. I learned about the shelter but still went back to the streets that night. It kept weighing on me though, and I knew I had to go back. I finally did.

What was it like once you made the decision to stay at the Mission?

It was a huge relief. For the first time in a long time, I felt safe and cared for. Just four days after staying there, I was introduced to the New Life program, and it felt like the answer to all my prayers. I needed a new life, and this was my chance to find it. I joined the program and began building a relationship with God, which completely transformed everything for me.

That's an incredible transformation. How did being part of the New Life program affect you?

It was nothing short of life-changing. I started serving others, particularly the women and children at the shelter. That was the first time in years that I felt wanted and needed. I was able to step out of my own pain and start helping others. It also gave me the opportunity to finish my high school diploma, which was a huge accomplishment for me.

Graduating from the program and earning your diploma is definitely a big achievement. What inspired you to stay at the Mission after that?

I felt called to stay. Instead of going back into the workforce, I wanted to give back to the place that gave me a second chance. I applied for a job at the Mission, and I've now been working here for over eight years. It's been ten years since I first came to the Mission, and every day I'm grateful to be able to help others who are in the same situation I was in.

That's amazing dedication. What's the most difficult part of your job now?

The hardest part is turning women and children away. We're at full capacity, and just yesterday, I had to turn away five women and children. We have a long waiting list, but knowing that people are out there still suffering, especially women and children, is heartbreaking. I think about my own experiences and wonder where they'll go or if they're being abused. It's tough.

That sounds incredibly challenging. How do you find the strength to keep going?

My Favorite Bible Verses

"I can do all things through Him who gives me strength."

- Philippians 4:13

"Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins."

- 1 Peter 4:8

It's tough, but knowing that there's hope ahead keeps me going. With Hannah's House coming soon, we'll be able to expand and provide more shelter for women and children. It's a huge blessing, and it gives me hope knowing that soon, fewer people will have to be turned away.

What are your hopes for the future, especially with Hannah's House on the horizon?

My hope is that no woman or child will ever be turned away again. Hannah's House will be a safe haven, and I'm so grateful that we'll be able to help more women and children break the cycle of abuse and addiction—just like I did. It's about giving people the opportunity to start over.

Gina, your story is incredibly inspiring. Thank you so much for sharing it with us today. It's amazing to see how far you've come and the impact you're now making in the lives of others.

Thank you for letting me share. I'm just grateful for what God has done in my life and the opportunity to give back.

My name is Michael, and my addiction began innocently at the age of 12 with smoking weed. By 14, I had progressed to meth. I became a ward of the court, and by 15, my parents barely had any control over me. The judge felt like a father figure, and my probation officer felt like a mother. Between the ages of 12 and 18, I spent a couple of years behind bars.

At 19, I had my daughter, but even that wasn't enough to change me. For 15 more years, I was consumed by gangs, addiction, and incarceration. In that time, I lost everything—I trusted the wrong people, got betrayed, hurt, and shot multiple times. The pain of wasted time and broken relationships haunted me.

I arrived in Modesto with nothing but scars, one of which was a bullet wound on my head that reminds me of the battles I've fought. But the Modesto Gospel Mission saved my life—twice. This time, I found something I hadn't had in years: a real family. The people here have become more than friends; they're my new family, and I would gladly choose them over anyone I've known over the last 20 years.

God brought me to the Mission, and I'm grateful He did. Staying close to my church and humble before God, I know I'm where I need to be. Nothing is impossible with God. The Word says, "I'm possible," and today, I truly believe that.

My name is Erin McCormick. I grew up in Sonora, CA, with a love for the outdoors, but I was raised by a single mother who had poor boundaries. Addiction was present in my family, and by my twenties, I had experienced trauma and was diagnosed with agoraphobia, which led me to self-medicate with alcohol. What started as a coping mechanism turned into a 20-year struggle with addiction, marked by relapses, rehab, and jail time.

Four years ago, I reached my lowest point and cried out to God for help. I was rescued from a dangerous situation, and I committed to change. When I came to the Gospel Mission earlier this year, I was broken, but I knew it was where I needed to be. The support and structure have helped me face my past and begin to heal.

I am now working and rebuilding my life. My relationship with my children, especially my son, has been restored, and I'm beginning to believe in myself again. God has been faithful in restoring my family, health, and finances. Though the journey is tough, I know I'm being transformed, and I'm deeply grateful for the Mission's support.





Coming to the Mission has kept me out of trouble, and with their support, my life is finally back on track.



My name is Michael Beck. By the time I was 17, I had started using and dealing drugs and firearms. This lifestyle brought me nothing but trouble, so after many years, I decided to settle down and get married. That ended up not working out, and I found myself on my own again.

After losing several vehicles, getting into legal trouble, and serving time in jail, I suffered a back injury while riding a bus. Following my release from jail, I told my story to the worker there, and she told me about the Mission and called Chaplain Cole. He told her to go ahead and send me to Modesto; he had a shelter bed for me.

When I arrived, I found the Mission to be a safe, Christian environment. They made sure I was fed three meals and two snacks every day. They generously provided me with clothing at no cost, and a hot shower and warm bed every night. Through their Day Program, I was able to get my vital records back, set up healthcare, and connect with a Social Security advocate who helped me get approved for SSDI after several prior denials.

Coming to the Mission has kept me out of trouble, and with their support, my life is finally back on track. I'm saving money and hope to find housing soon. I'm incredibly thankful to God and the Mission for their help.

My name is Prue, and I am 15 years old. I've been coming to the Youth Center since May 2024.

I love coming here and I love the staff. I've learned a lot about being a leader. At first, I would get upset and irritated when I was reminded to show respect and be responsible, but then I had to remember —they are welcoming and helpful, and they're here to teach me important things I need to be successful.

In August, I was sworn in as a Junior Volunteer. I help serve snacks, clean, and assist other kids around the Youth Center. I'm learning what it's like to have a job and be on shift, and it makes me feel good as a person. I plan to keep coming here until I'm 18, and then I want to volunteer when I turn 18. I'm also good at playing the trumpet and singing, which I get to do here.

I'm very grateful to have a place where I can get help with homework, learn about God, and make friends. I love that my siblings are also Junior Volunteers and are learning too! The Youth Center is an awesome place!
